



New powers to stop vehicles

Sussex has become the latest police force to make it possible for vehicles to be stopped without a police officer being present.

Staff from the Vehicle and Operator Services Agency (VOSA) have now been accredited with the power to stop goods and passenger vehicles for spot-checks in Sussex.

VOSA officers will operate using Ford Galaxies with distinctive yellow-and-black battenburg side markings, yellow-and-orange chevrons at the rear and a roof bar with amber lights.

In the past a police officer has always been present during spot-checks as only they had the authority to stop vehicles. This new power to stop commercial vehicles and private motorists will increase VOSA's effectiveness and flexibility in targeting vehicles which are likely to break roadworthiness and traffic legislation.

The males are described as white and in their 20's and left on foot towards Broadoak. Keep a special look out for elderly neighbours or relatives or those living alone? Make sure they are aware of what to do if they have an unannounced caller.

Conmen warning

Householders are being warned about burglars who have been conning their way into the homes of vulnerable people. On one day alone they made six attempts, in Rye, Hastings, Brede and Guestling. Now the public is being asked to help find and stop them. In each case, the men used the same method of tricking their way into

someone's house. One calls at the door and says that he's from the water board or he's a builder and tells the occupant he needs to check the water pressure or the drains. Once he's inside the house, a second man enters, carries out a search and steals what he can while the householder's attention is being diverted.

The first is described as being in his late 20s with short, dark hair and about 5ft 4in tall. He's clean-shaven with prominent front teeth and victims say he had a smart

appearance. The second man is a little older and had an untidy appearance. He had brown, messy hair and was wearing a biscuit-coloured jacket.

fter the recent winter work some real changes are visible at Nook Point – near the river mouth with a large new concrete wall and several rock emplacements. As everyone is doubtless aware these are part of the continuing programme to upgrade the flood defences in the coastal segment wall is a neat piece of civil between Pett Level and Rye Harbour. armouring to wave action -The river mouth is also protected from shingle being washed into it, so avoiding blockage of the river channel and increasing the flood risk along the River Rother. The shape of the beach appears already to have changed significantly, not only at Pett Level but in the sector between the old Lifeboat House and Nook Point.

These works form only part of the programme to protect the whole length of the coast; the protective barrier between Nook Point and Winchelsea Beach. If there were to be a breach by the sea through the line of the beach, it would then cause extensive flooding across the Nature Reserve, threatening Rye Harbour and Winchelsea as happened in 1929, the flood area could extend over several square-miles. - 1) Install a new groyne field at Winchelsea Beach.
- 2) Install a secondary flood defence embankment between Winchelsea Beach and Rye Harbour.
- 3) Upgrade approximately 600 metres of the bund facing the River Rother.

The construction of the secondary defence embankment will have a visual and environmental impact on the village, especially the Frenchman's Beach caravan park and the Nature Reserve. It is planned to start this work next from outside; since the

September. The Environment Agency has purchased Rye Harbour Farm and will use some of the area as raw material to build the embankment,

moving approximately 120,000 cubic metres of material, including some that may well have to come in from outside the area. The detailed design for the secondary defences is currently being finalised, but in general the line will run along the existing drain between

er scheme of East Sussex County Council and without their support there would be no bus service. The operators being Coastal Coaches who have a very good bunch of drivers looking after us.

Senior Citizens or physically or mentally handicapped can obtain a free bus pass which entitles bearers to half fares all over Sussex and journeys into Kent, starting in Sussex such as the 711 route to Dover. Another good buy is a transfer ticket from Rve Harbour via Winchelsea Beach service 344 or service 300 via Broad Oak to the Conquest, this is a very good buy particularly with a half fare card.



Also available are weekly tickets, or explorer tickets for those going further afield, to Bournemouth if you want and you start off early enough.

Finally we are fortunate to have such a frequent bus service, but this only depends on the support given.

There are some villages not

so very far away with only two or three buses per week.

Lets hope that we don't end up this way; otherwise we may find ourselves in the same position, as in paragraph two and three.

geneticist now working and living in New Zealand having previously worked in the USA.

James lists the qualities needed for their enterprise are resources, space, skill, tenacity and above all pleasure in creating. They decided to build the boat in 1990. Robert had been doing dinghy sailing at school and enthused about it and James and Kate were infected by his enthusiasm. They decided on a Folk Boat design as it was created for ordinary people Rye Harbour to make from supplied plans and for ordinary people to sail. They also appreciated the shape and form - form and function and purpose is very

apparent in the shape.

They found the Iron House by the river in Rock Channel and fitted it out as carefully as the boat and

really do not need a TV as they have a close up view of the river and all that goes on there and boats and people that pass! They started sailing by joining the Sailing Club and did Gordon Mooreys' excellent Day skipper shore based RYA course at the club who they found really

inspiring. They went sailing with Liz and Ken Steele. They flew up to Stornoway, Outer Isles of Lewes to join Ken and Jill Halpin on their boat Spindrift and also sailed with us to Fecamps in northern France where we visited the Benedictine Abbey.

There was a lot of work involved in sourcing materials. They were helped by the Folk Boat association who provided plans and through whom they met someone who had moulds for the keel. They had to loft up drawing plans 1/10 to full size drawn out on plywood and

make templates. They found a supply of solid oak competition in the 1940's in Yorkshire. They obtained the cast iron keel in Cornwall. They started with the spine of the boat and then fitted sections through and then put battens round the moulds which then have the steamed (at 100 degrees centigrade in their handbuilt oven) ribs bent around and against the battens to get their shape. The battens are taken off as you bend the planks of the larch, which must be clean, clear of knots, to create the carvel build of the hull of the boat. The planks they obtained from Woodbridge, Suffolk. The ribs are steamed green oak with the inner plank - shelf - sprung inside.

The Folk Boat originated

in Scandinavia from a where 4 people's designs were chosen and the final design was by committee. Kate and James brought their mast which is Scandinavian spruce from Denmark.

The fitting out is individual and owes everything to James' cabinet making design experience.

FISHING NEWS

ROUND RYE BAY FOR MORE

s April comes to an end, all but one boat have swapped over to trawling from the scallop fishery with this season being well down in quantity caught and price per dozen or price per Kg. The markets seem to have been well supplied from boats all around the coast. with a lot more French vessels joining in the fishing making quite an impact on the demand. Boats are now using a mixture of fishing trawls

from the triple rig, single trawl with longer sweeps, rough ground trawl called the rock hopper and one boat is using two beam trawls, fishing in the bay for Dover Sole.

Results have been nothing special so far for the most but a couple of boats had good catches of Plaice one week and the Dover Sole catch has gone up slightly as the month has progressed. Other species have not showed at all yet apart from a run of Bass when the neap tide was at

its lowest, this was short lived but very welcome, making up for the lack of any Whiting, Lemon Sole, Cod and Dog Fish.

The netters are finding a fair return at the moment and are making the most of the reasonable weather, with good catches of Dover Sole and Plaice, leaving nets overnight and fishing the gear during the day, they are being hampered to much by weed or crabs.




